## **Against Forgetting: The Human Condition** **An Exhibit of Painted Images and Verse** **Marcia Cowles Bushnell**

### **Artist's Statement**

The paintings were done in the last 20 years and document the rising flow of refugees worldwide: the Vietnam boat people, the Kurds, the families from Kosovo, Iraq, Rwanda, Chechnya, Central America, and Palestine among others. Many of the paintings show the plight of children who their elders are unable or unwilling to protect and who are sacrificed on the altars of political and holy wars.

Archbishop Desmond Tutu has declared; "We live in a moral world." We must cling to that belief, for our whole humanity is diminished if we become immune to the violence around us or burn-out in resignation. The title of the show is "Against Forgetting: the Human Condition". It is hoped that by facing and sharing together, the pain of others, we may be rededicated to serving peace and the wellbeing of all.

Another way to look at these paintings is from the personal knowledge that we are all on a journey to somewhere else. At times we feel displaced. Perhaps we have become disoriented within our own culture, by technology, changing values, or are far from the place we had envisioned we would be or the person we would become. May these paintings remind us that we live in a world undergoing huge transition and we are often far from home as are these others in our care.
